WORD	DEFINITION
Bakery	A place where bread and cakes are made and sold.
Diary	A book in which people write about their lives.
Eye witness	A person who has seen something happen and can give a description of it.
Firebreak	Buildings are destroyed to make a break so the fire can't spread.
Fire hook	Giant hooks used to pull houses down.
Flammable	Something that burns easily.
River Thames	The river that runs through London.
Thatched roof	A roof made of dry vegetation (straw and reeds).

- ❖ The fire started on Sunday 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1666 in Thomas Farriner's bakery on Pudding Lane.
- ❖ London was hot and dry. The houses were made from wood and straw and were flammable. The houses were very close together so the fire spread easily. Strong winds also helped spread the flames.
- ❖ There was no fire brigade. People had to use leather buckets and water squirts to try and put the fire out.
- ❖ King Charles 11 ordered buildings to be pulled down (using gunpowder) to make a firebreak. This stopped the flames from spreading.
- ❖ The fire was finally put out on Thursday 6<sup>th</sup> September 1666.
- ❖ Over 13,000 houses were destroyed by the fire. 70,000 people were left homeless.
- ❖ St Paul's Cathedral was destroyed in the fire.
- ❖ After the fire, King Charles said that houses must be built further apart and built from stone not wood.
- ❖ The Monument was built to remind us of the Great Fire.



**Samuel Pepys**

Samuel Pepys lived in London during the Great Fire of London and wrote about it in his diary.



**Thomas Farriner**

Thomas Farriner was the owner of the bakery on Pudding Lane where the fire started.



**King Charles II**

King Charles II was the King of England in 1666. After the fire he said that houses must be built further apart and built from stone not wood.
