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
This project began with a six week unit delivered to the whole of Year 5. The aims of the unit were:

Children to use a range of sources and research opportunities to find out what life was like in Ilkley during the first World War. The children will research a soldier whose name appears on the memorial in All Saints Church. They will look at his life before the war, and how things changed for his family when he went to the war. The children will also discover that Ilkley provided a home for Belgium refugees and that the local people raised money for an ambulance that would go to the front line.

This unit will be planned with the help of Mike Akerman from the Western Front Association. Our findings will be presented in All Saints' Church for members of the public to view as well as in a Collective Worship for the rest of the school.

Further research was then conducted by the children of History Club.



To start our research project, the children were taken to our local church where we looked at the war memorials. We noted the names of the soldiers on the WW1 memorial and then in lesson 2 the children were asked to use the internet to find out as much as they could about any of the names.








This is a picture of the Second contingent of Territorial Army Volunteers, who would be sent overseas to fight in the war. It was taken outside the Drill Hall on Victoria Road, in Ilkley, in 1914.

First, the children annotated it with the words and phrases shown.

Then, the children were asked to write as if they were one of the soldiers in the picture and describe how they think they would be feeling.


Some of the independent research the children completed.

G.H. Featherstone: Able Seaman Z/6749, Royal Navy. Volunteered. No sea experience beforehand. Killed in action 13th November 1916. Born in Pateley Bridge, moved to 3 Ash Grove, Ilkley. Was a gardener working with his father.

Thomas Healey: Private 12885, 9th Battalion West Riding Regiment, Ilkley Pals. Second Ilkley Pal to die on 2nd March 1916. Killed in action. Lived in the Station Hotel Ilkley. Electrician. Footballer at Ilkley AFC. Buried in Bedford House Military Cemetery.

B. Dacre: Volunteered during the first month of the war. He nearly survived the war, died 12th October 1918. Signed up with his brother. Killed in action. Possibly in the photo on page 5 taken outside Kings Hall, Ilkley. He was a very good soldier.

Another name from the memorial on the previous page was Frederick Bott. Here is his Baptism record.



It was discussed with the children as to why there was no birth certificate to be found, only this Baptism record.


Things the children found out from the Baptism record:


- The year was 1882
- St Margaret's Church, Ilkley
- His parents were called Phillip and Maria
- Baptised on 12th March 1882
- Two children baptised that same day
- Eight children baptised in March
- His address was 42 Wellington Road, Ilkley
- Father was a Carter
- Vicar came from Otley
- Most fathers had jobs that used their hands
- The most popular job was 'mason'
- No computers at the time
- Handwriting was neat and used fountain pen





<u>Case Study – The Bott Family</u>

We looked at these three censuses from 1891, 1901 and 1911, showing the Bott family.










Mind maps created by the children, in groups, showing what they've discovered from the censuses.

An enthusiastic class discussion followed about what information was found, how the censuses changed and how more information was provided as the years went on.



The children found it particularly interesting that many people had lodgers back then, possibly to supplement household income, due to their professions.

So much was learnt, not just about the circumstances of the Bott family, but also of the working class families of Ilkley in general.



- Children had to do more jobs like feeding animals and weeding the garden
- Food was rationed not as much of certain foods
- Boy Scouts and Girl Guides
- Families had to adapt to fathers and big brothers being away at war
- Children had a lot more responsibilities
- The women had to get jobs e.g. in shops, making ammunition, postwomen, looking after animals and horses, everyone had to do their part

What did the people of Ilkley do to help the war effort?

- They raised money to buy an ambulance to send to the front line
- Ilkley looked after wounded soldiers in their hospital
- Ilkley provided a home for 62 Belgian refugees



The children thoroughly enjoyed meeting Mike and learning more about the war. They felt particularly honoured to be able to handle some of his precious memorabilia.













Sue Steel – Bradford Family History Society





Sue presented the stories of two children, who had attended All Saints' Primary School during the war, and showed the children their family trees.

She then helped the children create their own family trees. This helped the children better understand the Bott family tree.



Each lesson began with a 'starter' for the children to explore. This was by way of looking at a photo, and writing what they saw, what they thought and what they wondered. All photos are linked to the Ilkley area.





How did lige in Albery change during WW1?

During the war many things changed. Lots of people changed their diet and even their ligestyle. These things included...

The amount of men decreased hugely bestween the years of 1914 and 1918, this was due to the cause of the war as all somen aged 18-40 were sent of as soldiers to the battle feith. Since guns had not yet been invented, the men still jought with heavy words and rode on horses, sadly many died and the battle feild was a noisy, chaotic and bloody place to be, No one wanted to go there. The battle feilds were mainly in Belgium and France.

Since the Battle zeilds' were in Belgium and France there were many people who to could no longer live there due to the course that their bouses were getting hombed way too much and gives gives were everywhere. Ithly decided that they would taken some of the R. U.G.s from Belgium. Our town (Ilkling) took in a whoping number which was analysabloute ton in those days.

The Belgum ozigs and older were ladges in house in the first world war, buy would pay the ladge owners of the houses and may ever help with jobs around the house like child minding, cooking or even gardening. This would help them get a discount on legir stay and the amount would depend on how much they did.

Schools were also asjected in the war. Some men teaching had gone to work and some whole schools had to close down due to a lack of leaches. This meant that children would, in some cases, not have got as good a education as they were meant to.

Many soldiers came to Italy during WW1 with white peak lats. They would camp in them, comming and going. They would tend to be explainated and joinly grin, from all the jighting going on and tended to wear a wnem uniform so that they could be recognised by their commander.

Sadly, the nomen and children would book ravely have fartness to be with When and ig the time came, the mother would recive a letter from the army saying that the husband had died. It was a sad line for many weeks when you recived some of such. Not at all pleasant. It usually includes short like bow they died and where they were buried in the letter.

When the new got injured, there wasn't much anyone could do about it. There was a bospital in Ilkley but we couldn't get the men to to on time so Ilkley raised money and donated it to an ambulance to lake men back have (ILKLEY) and they were sent to the hospital.

Food was rationed during the war because there wasn't as much good as there was beginned. It was limited for each person and a bigger trousehold would get a tiny bit more than a smaller jamily. This may have helped with some peoples diets and poor people may actually get more than they had begine.

COMMEMORATED IN PERPETUTY BY THE COMMONWEALTH WAR GRAVES COMMISSION

- 2/5 West Yorkshire Regiment
- Killed in action 18th May 1918, aged 36 years
- He had 4 surviving children in total
- Born in Ilkley
- A gardener working in one of the nurseries in Ilkley, who provided fresh fruit and vegetables
- One of 7 children, but the only one to survive childhood
- In 1908 he married Elizabeth Padgett and moved to 13 Wellington Road, Ilkley
- In November 1916 he was called up
- By October 1917 he was in France
- When he died he was at the front line in the Somme
- One night a group of men was sent out into No Mans land to dig trenches. They completed this task but then a German machinegun opened fire and he was hit in the back.
- He was buried in a military cemetery
- He was described as a 'reliable soldier' and 'a good fellow'
- At the time of his death he had 15 francs in his pocket, which was later returned to his wife

Private 28349 Bertram Haigh

Whilst not connected to Ilkley, Private Bertram Haigh is actually the Great, Great Uncle of one of our children, pictured in the centre of the photo below. She was kindly allowed to bring in Bertram's war medals and badges to show us. The family knew some information about Bertram but we were able to provide much more insight with documents they have not previously seen or even knew existed.

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
- West Yorkshire Regiment, Leeds Pals
- Born 25th July 1894 in Thornton, Bradford
- Left school aged 12 to work in a foundry in Halifax
- Enlisted on 12th December 1915
- He was seriously wounded during service and was brought back to England where he convalesced in Southport
- Discharged 16th April 1918
- Known to friends and family as 'Bert'
- Returned to the brass foundry where he worked until his retirement
- He never married, but was close to his niece and family who lived in Bradford
- He loved football and supported Halifax FC
- He died 6th January 1992 aged 97
- Silver War Badge given to be worn on civilian clothing with pride to let others know he served

Private 29314 Harold Clarkson

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- Born in Burley in September 1897
- Only young when his family moved to Ilkley
- Lived at 107 Leeds Road and his father owned a Bakery at 10 Skipton Road
- He attended All Saints' School
- Became an apprentice Motor Mechanic
- First applied to join the army in Halifax on 7th December 1915. Was sent back to Ilkley to begin his training at the Drill Hall on Leeds Road
- On 10th May 1916 he joined the West Riding Regiment Training Battalion called The Duke Of Wellington's
- Arrived in France January 1917
- Joined 10th Battalion, who already had lots of men from Ilkley and surrounding villages in it
- On 30th May 1917 he was hit by a German shell at around 8am and died, aged just 19 years old

Gunner 65890 William Lambert Kendall

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William Lambert Kendall is a name on the All Saints' Church memorial, and is also the Great Grandfather of one of our Year 5 pupils

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- William "Bill" Kendall born 9th March 1894
- Lived at 4 Leeds Road, Ilkley
- Parents called Thomas and Elizabeth
- Two brothers
- Father was a tobacconist
- Shortly after having Bill the family moved the shop to 25 Church Street and lived above it
- Bill became a fireman when he left school
- Then became a postman working at the sorting office on Wells Road, Ilkley
- Enlisted into the Royal Garrison Artillery in Leeds on 1st November 1915
- Within a few days he was sent to Dover
- The following year he headed to France and joined the training school of the British Second Army
- After just one month of training he joined the others in the trenches
- On 10th May he was serving on the front line and got a shrapnel wound to his left shoulder
- He went to hospital in France, then came back to Birmingham for further treatment
- He also got a short period of leave where he came back to Ilkley to spend some time with his family
- He returned to France in September 1916
- Killed in action on 3rd October 1918 at 24 years of age



Timeline created by the children



- Born in Ilkley 29th December 1887
- Daughter of Christopher and Mary Watson
- Her father was a land agent and they lived at The Rocks on Crossbeck Road in Ilkley
- Had three siblings
- When Dorothy was nine years old her father died rather than ending up in the workhouse or having to appeal to family and charities, as Christopher was a Freemason they were able to appeal to that body for charitable relief. This meant that Dorothy was sent to a boarding school in London for 8 years
- During this time Dorothy's mother died
- When Dorothy was 17 she returned back home to Yorkshire and lived with her distant uncle in Harrogate
- She enrolled as a Trainee Nurse at Harrogate General Hospital where she remained until the beginning of the war
- Dorothy wanted to 'do her bit' and applied to join the Territorial Force Nursing Service
- She worked in Leeds Military Hospital
- In 1916 she decided to serve as a nurse overseas and went to Malta
- In March 1917 Dorothy contracted measles which developed into toxaemia
- Thoughtful to the end and in preparation of her end, Dorothy left a letter explaining how she wanted her
 possessions distributed
- She is remembered with a stone cross at a Maltese hospital which was paid for by other staff members, showing how popular and loved she was (see photo on page 43)
- She is also remembered on the war memorial in Harrogate
